

- To confirm entry requirements and specific subject requirements please check post-16 prospectuses carefully.
- Students who are only just eligible for a Level 3 course, must make sure they also apply for a Level 2 course as a back-up.
- Students who achieve grade 3 or below in English and/or Maths will need to continue working towards their GCSE. Those with grade 3 need to retake GCSE, those with 2 and below can take qualifications that lead to GCSE or take GCSE. Students at CRC will retake GCSE English and/or maths if they have achieved a grade 2 or 3









- projected qualifications
- reference from the school (includes information on attitude, attendance and behaviour)
